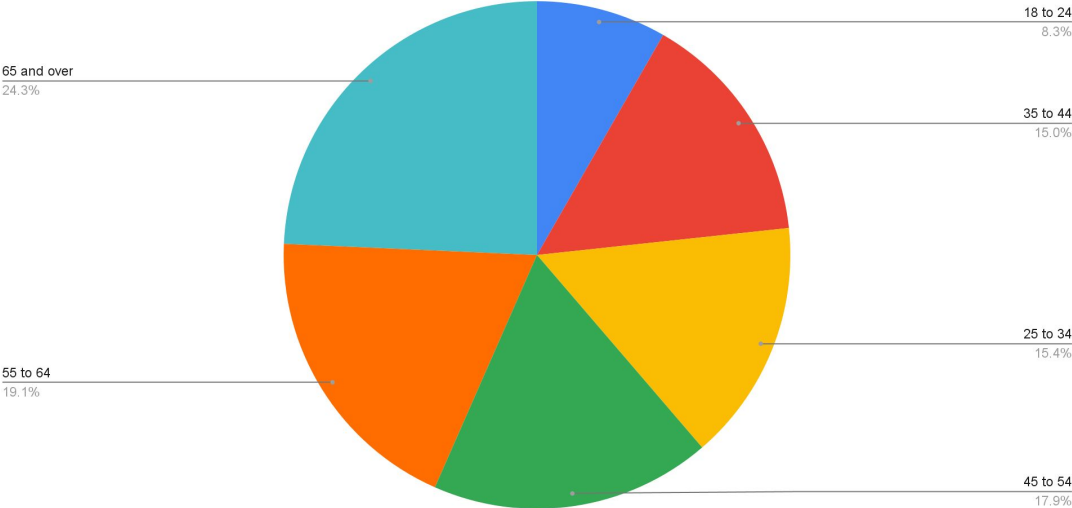

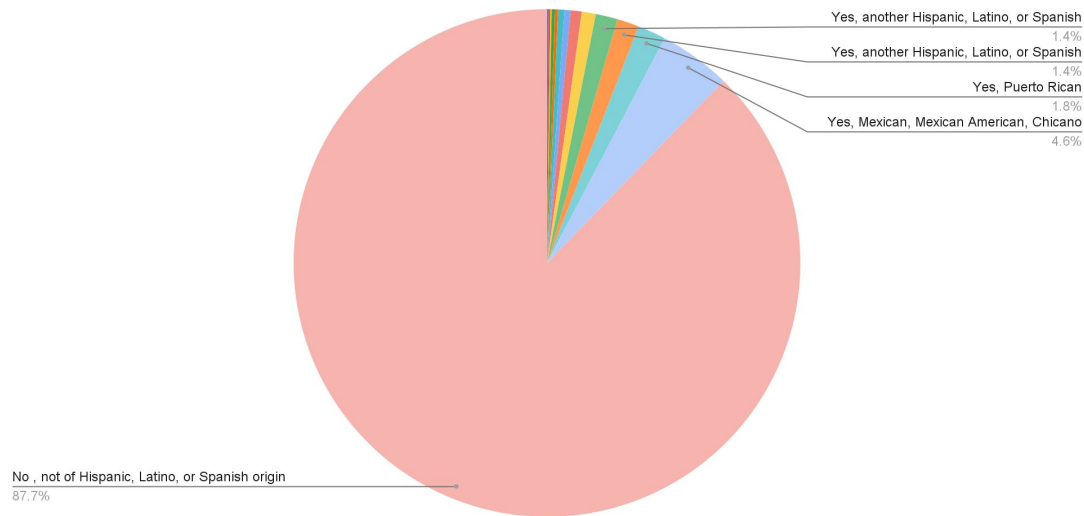

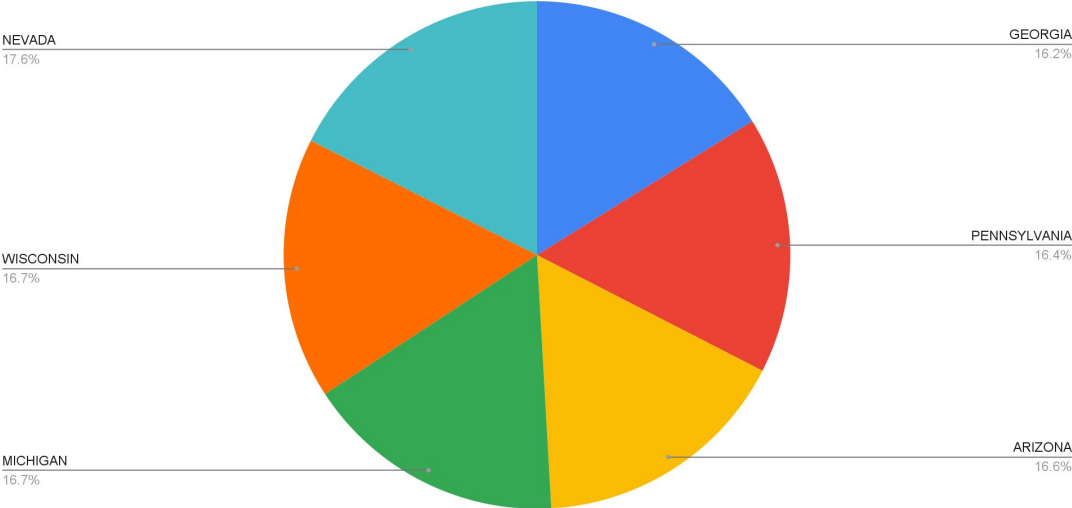


Demographics: Are you of Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin?



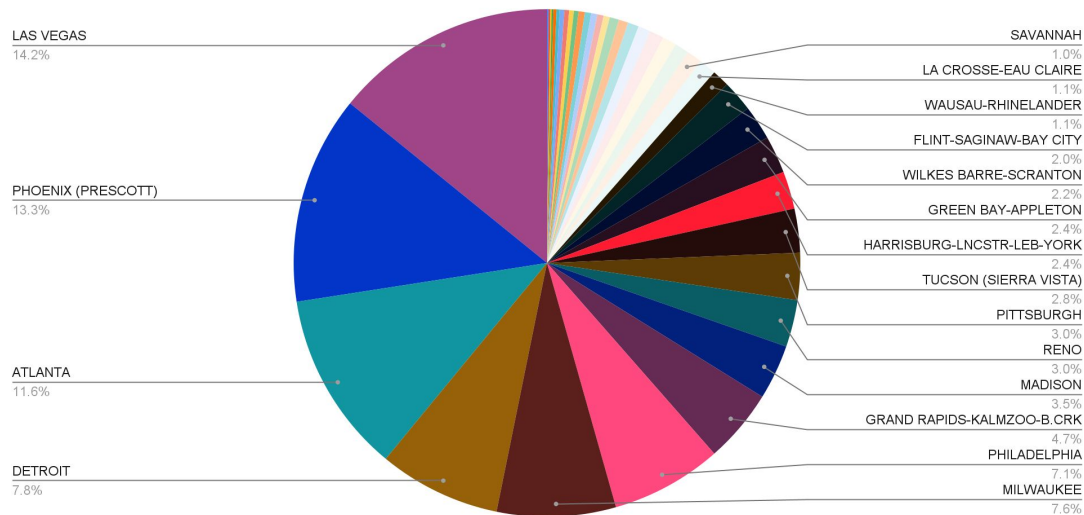


Demographics: What is your state?



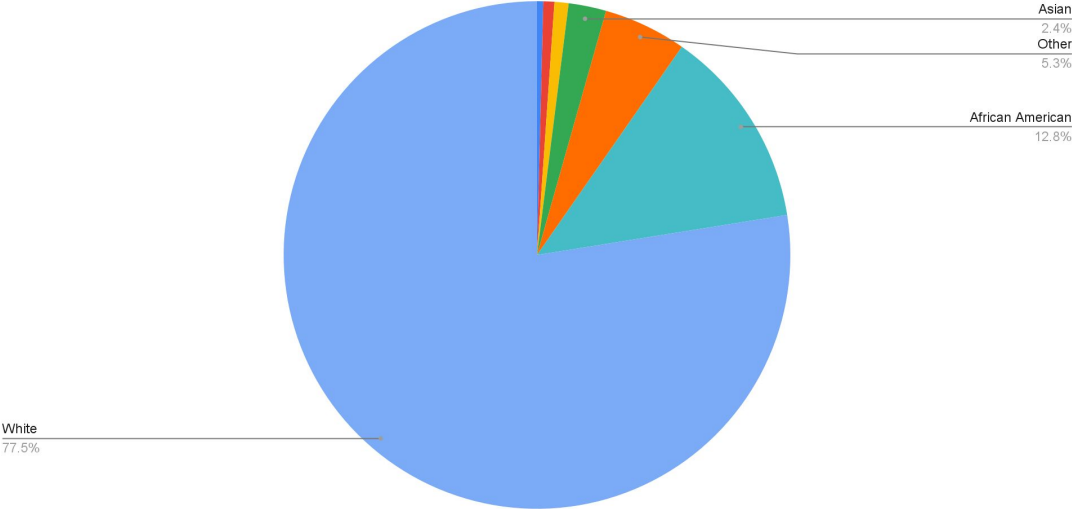


Demographics: What is your DMA?



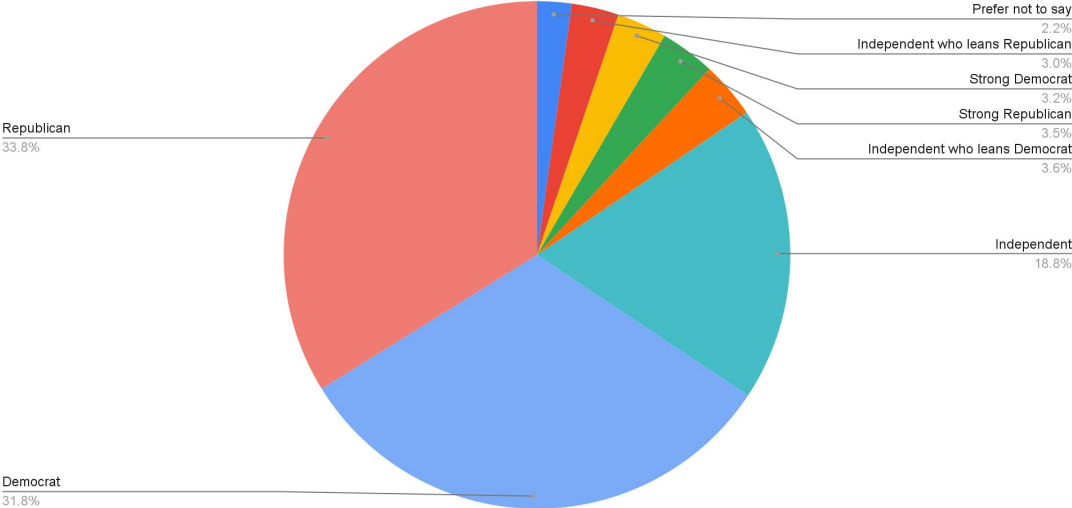


Demographics: What is your race?



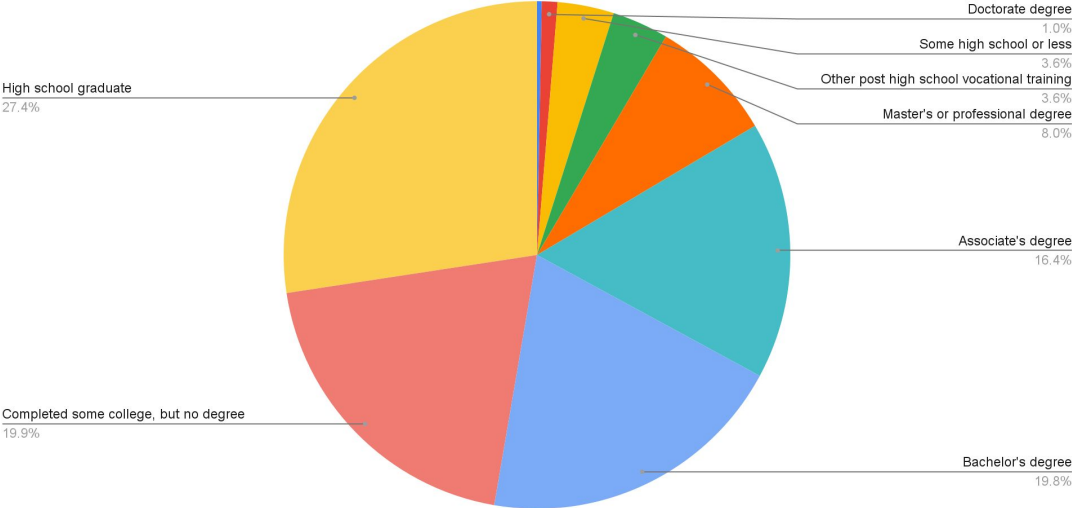


Demographics: In politics today, do you consider yourself a Democrat, Republican, or Independent?



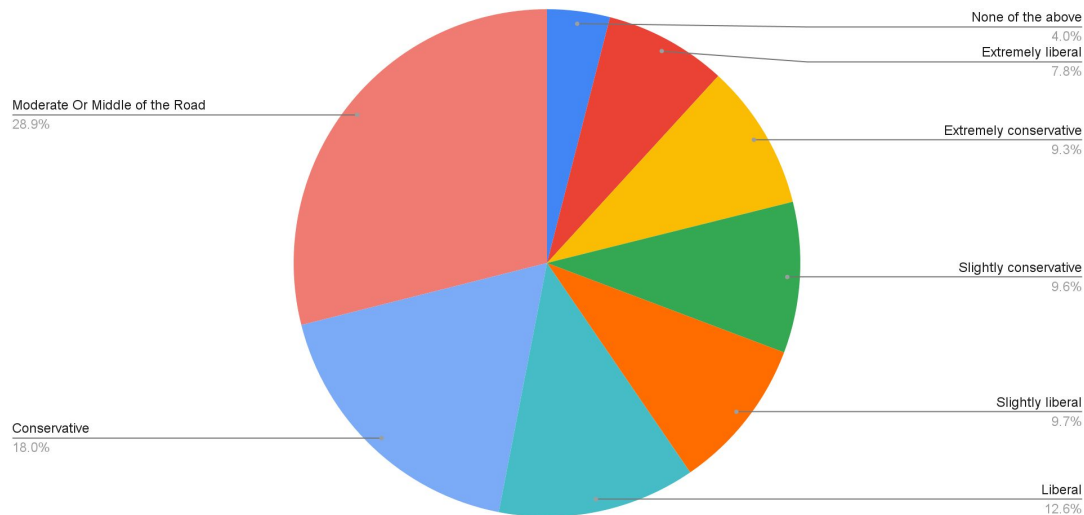


Demographics: What is the highest level of education you have completed?





Demographics: In terms of your political views, do you consider yourself...

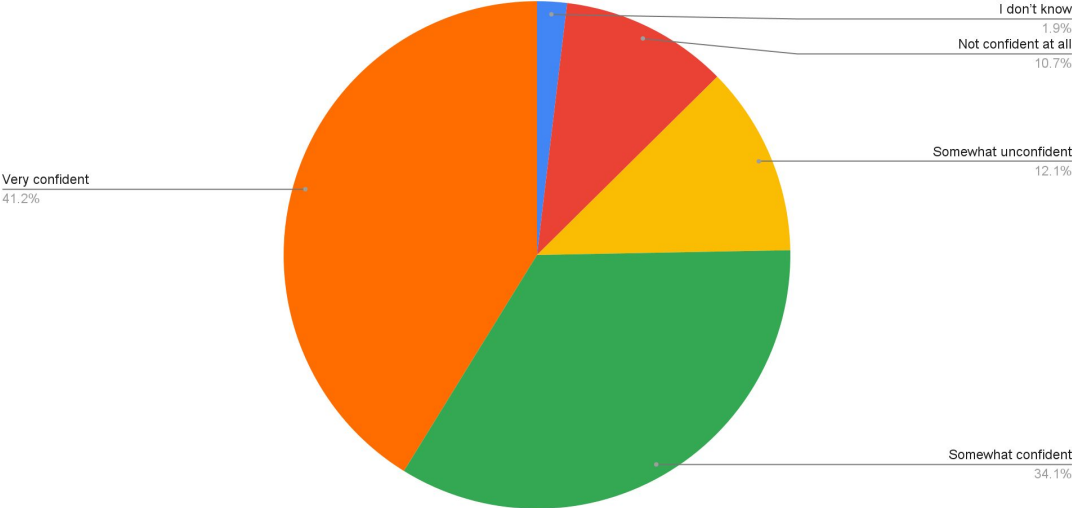

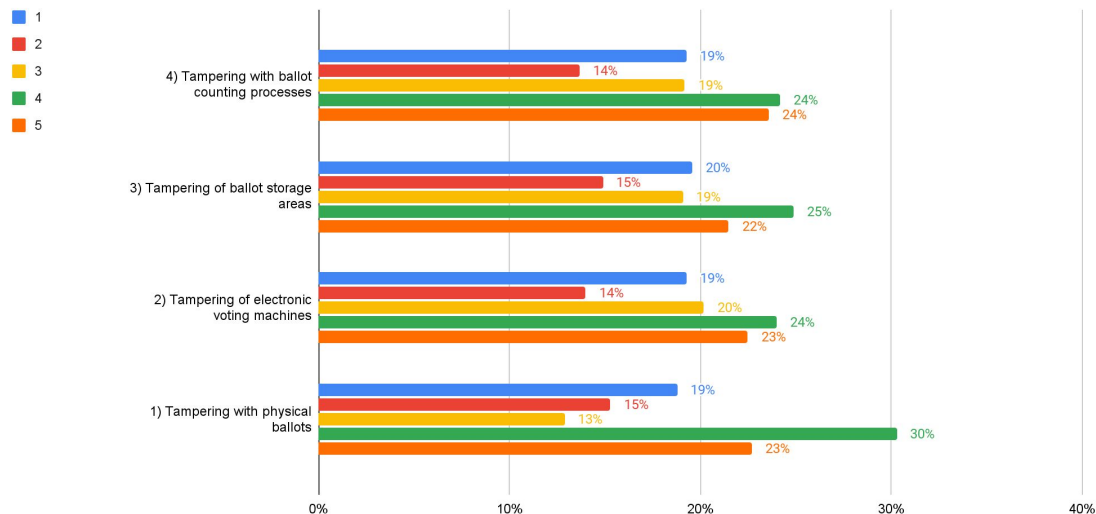


Q1: How confident are you that the security measures in place to safeguard voting machines and the ballot-counting process will ensure the accuracy of election results in 2024?



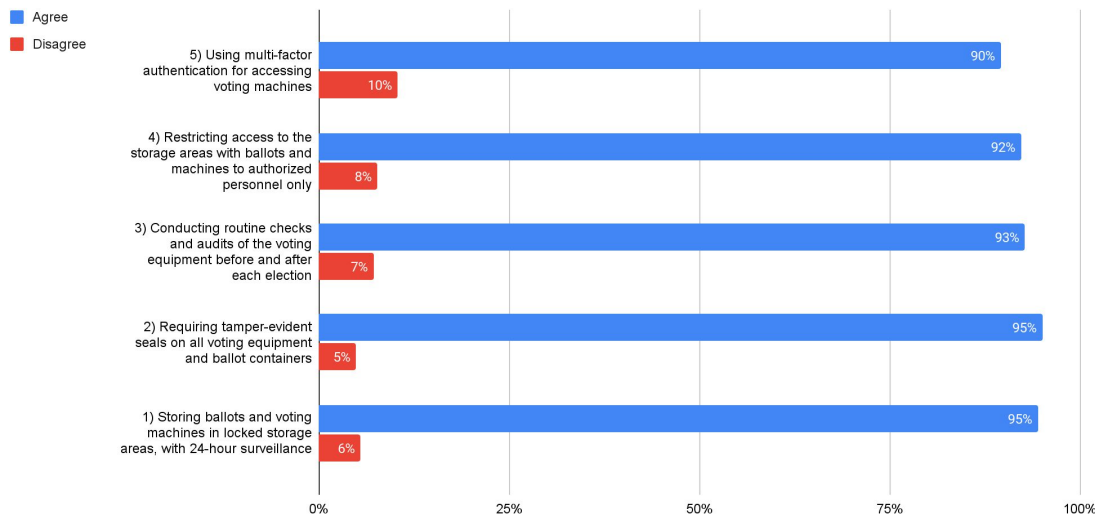

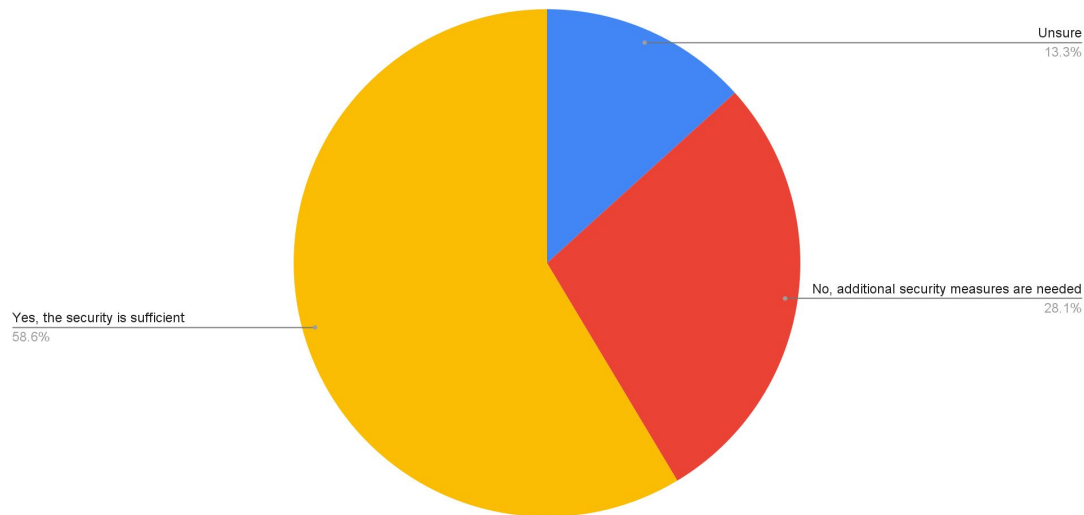


Q3: To what extent do you agree or disagree with election officials taking the following steps to secure voting machines and ballots in order to prevent tampering?

Q5: For respondents who answered affirmatively to answers B or C in Question 3, what specific concerns or suggestions, if any, do you have about the surveillance of polling locations or USPS mailboxes/ballot drop boxes in your area?

- Some voters expressed a high level of concern for security and suggested increased measures, such as non-conspicuous envelopes for ballots, more surveillance, and designated personnel to watch over the process.
- Issues with normal mail being misplaced or stolen led to distrust in the safety of mail-in ballots.
- A number of respondents had no concerns or were unsure about the issue.
- Others feared potential fraud, ballot tampering, and the fairness of elections, with some suggesting that voting should only be done in person on election day.
- There were calls for bipartisan monitoring, use of technology for better security, and concerns about privacy infringement due to increased surveillance.
- A few individuals mentioned past experiences with ballot harvesting or altering, and some believed that mail-in ballots are the primary avenue for potential fraud.
- Concerns about intimidation at voting centers, the possibility of corrupt officials, and the security of the chain of custody for ballots were also noted.
- Suggestions included having live streams of voting areas, requiring voter ID, and ensuring that security personnel are thoroughly vetted.
- Some voters indicated a lack of trust in the current system, while others felt that the existing measures were sufficient or had no specific concerns.
